Pentecost serving—Energy (Gifts of the Holy Spirit), New Life (To hear & live the Easter message), Transformation (the Spirit's transforming power), Witnesses (The Holy Spirit enables people to become witnesses).

Reconciliation Inter-relating—Choices (conscience and Reconciliation), Building Bridges (admitting wrong, being reconciled with God and each other, Sacrament of Reconciliation), Freedom and Responsibility (commandments), Healing (Sacrament of the
