

Headteacher's Letter

As the spring term comes to an end and we approach the Easter holiday, I wanted to take a moment to reflect on the significance of this special time in the Catholic faith.

Easter represents a time of renewal, with nature waking up after a cold, dark winter, offering warmer days, longer daylight and the signs of new life around us. It is also a time of hope and joy as we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ and are reminded of God's love for us. The many examples of charity and service that the community of Holy Cross has undertaken this Lenten season has certainly made others feel loved, and I thank our pupils and staff who are living the Easter spirit by following Jesus' call to serve and to love everyone, as He loves us.

Once again it has been a very busy term full of wonderful events and brilliant achievements. In class, the children continue to work hard, and I have been impressed with the level of engagement and enthusiasm they have shown towards their learning. There have been over 36,000 achievement points, 32 Headteacher Awards and three rewards breakfasts awarded this term in recognition of their effort and kindness to one another.

It is with immense pride that I reflect on our incredible school production of *We Will Rock You*. The children worked exceptionally hard, practising during lunch hours, afterschool and at weekends. The level of dedication and commitment should not be underestimated. They were also kind and incredibly supportive of one another. There was a real sense of camaraderie amongst the cast. Most importantly, the children had fun and have made memories that will last a lifetime.

Outside of the classroom, there have been many extra-curricular opportunities for our pupils this term. Pupils have visited the spectacular natural wonders of Iceland, the Palace of Westminster, Derwent Hill in the Lake District, as well as numerous visits to museums, colleges and theatres. As part of our Pupil Aspirations Programme, a small group of our Year 10 boys visited Eton College in Windsor and plans are in place for some of our Year 10 girls to visit Cheltenham Ladies' College later in the year.

In recognition of the church's Jubilee Year which is centred on the theme, "Pilgrims of Hope", staff and pupils from Holy Cross, and all our feeder primary schools, took a short pilgrimage to St Mary's church in Chorley to celebrate mass together. It was a wonderful occasion and, to my knowledge, the first time that all the Catholic schools in Chorley have come together, as one, to celebrate mass.

I continue to receive messages of thanks and appreciation from the parishioners of St Mary's. It really was a wonderful example of our family of schools working together to achieve great things.

Furthermore, our engagement with local parishes goes from strength to strength. This past week we held our SVP party, where senior members from all our parishes were treated to afternoon tea, games of bingo and musical entertainment. Pupils from our Leadership Academy did an excellent job organising and hosting this event and I know how much it meant to the parishioners who had a lovely time. I would also like to thank our parish priests who continue to support our school community. They are regular visitors to our school and continue to play a pivotal role in the education of our children.

Three weeks after our return from the Easter break, our Year 11 pupils will embark on their GCSE examinations. Our Saturday intervention classes have been very well received with over 100 Year 11 pupils attending each week. I have been impressed with the commitment and application the year group as a whole has so far shown towards their studies. I would encourage you to support your child to find time over the Easter break to study and revise for these exams to allow them to be fully prepared. It is also important to balance this with rest and activities that they enjoy doing.

At the end of term, we also say goodbye to Mrs Harrison (Music) and Mr Morriss (Mathematics). We wish them all the very best in their new endeavours and thank them for their commitment and selfless service towards the community of Holy Cross.

May I express my gratitude for your continued support of our school and for entrusting us with the education and wellbeing of your children. On behalf of the staff and governors of our school, I wish you and your family a happy and restful Easter.

Enrichment - British Science Week



During British Science Week, the Science department put on a number of activities for KS3 pupils. These involved pupils building towers using spaghetti and marshmallows, creating their own boat made of tin foil to withstand a certain mass, solving a crime which took place in the Science prep room and designing and building their own marble run. Pupils enjoyed the activities and engaged well with the theme *Adapt and Change!*

To further celebrate the British Science Week 2025 theme of *Adapt and Change*, the science department welcomed four new ducklings.

Pupils were able to observe the hatching of the ducklings and watch how they developed and grew each day - they were very popular members of the department and had lots of cuddles.

Enrichment - Iceland



On 13 February, 50 Years 10 and 11 Geography pupils embarked on an adventure of a lifetime to Iceland. We flew to Keflavik airport and spent our first few hours in the country exploring the city of Reykjavik. The next day, we had an early start to travel to the Golden Circle for the day. The day began with a visit to the geothermal centre, which highlighted how geothermal energy was made. Following this, we visited the Secret Lagoon, a geothermally heated pool, and some amazing waterfalls.

On day three, we took part in a South Shore Adventure day, this involved exploring the small town of Vik and its black sand beach, Gullfloss Waterfall, the Geysir Center, and Kerio Crater. The best part was seeing the Thingvellir National Park, here you could see the constructive plate boundary, where the Eurasian plate is moving away from the North American plate. In the evening, we used the hotel pool and then headed out on the Northern lights tour. We were lucky enough to see shades of green and pink take over the skies of rural Iceland.

On our last day on the island, we visited the Earthquake exhibition centre, where pupils experienced a magnitude 6 earthquake, then headed to the Frioheimar greenhouse and cultivation centre to look at how Iceland tries to reduce its need for imports to meet food security. Our final meal in Iceland was here, a delicious tomato soup and homemade bread, with tomatoes grown right in that very greenhouse.

The pupils who attended the trip had a brilliant time and were an absolute credit to the school. Our tour guide and the flight staff commented on their exceptional behaviour and attitude.



Enrichment - Leadership Visit to the Houses of Parliament

At the beginning of this term, pupils from the Leadership Academy took part in an educational visit to London. This was following an invitation from Parliament for 30 of our pupils to travel to London to represent their peers in an interactive Q&A session with The Rt Hon Sir Lindsay Hoyle, the Speaker of the House of Commons.

Our pupils demonstrated impressive enthusiasm and effort in creating thoughtful questions for Mr Speaker, focusing on his duties, inspirations, and advice for those considering a political career. They also discussed important issues affecting young people today, highlighting their maturity and insight.



During the visit, pupils represented Holy Cross with pride as ambassadors and role models. They enjoyed a detailed and informative tour of the Houses of Parliament, which enriched their understanding of British Values and their importance today. One key example that pupils took away was the explanation behind Sir Lindsay Hoyle's Coat of Arms, highlighting his Chorley upbringing and his motto of, "we are seen in action".

The day continued with a visit to the Natural History Museum, where pupils were fascinated by the extensive exhibits and numerous historical artefacts, such as the findings of Mary Anning, an inspirational palaeontologist.

Finally, they visited the Victoria and Albert Museum, where they had the chance to sketch various pieces of art on display. Our pupils represented the school to an impeccable standard.

Enrichment - Careers Fair

On Friday 28 February we hosted our annual Careers Fair in school. Pupils from Years 9 and 10 had the opportunity to speak to colleges, training providers, universities, local and national businesses about their post-16 options.

Enrichment - Holocaust Memorial Day

A poignant service was led by Father Marsden and wreaths were laid by the young people of Chorley to remember the 6 million Jews murdered in the Holocaust.

Mr Murray also delivered moving assemblies to all year groups. Holy Cross is committed to Holocaust Education, we have sent hundreds of our young people to visit Auschwitz and the concentration camps in Germany over the last decade.

The Head Girl visited Auschwitz in 2024 and the visit had a profound effect on her. Holly said "We are determined that the warnings of the Holocaust, on the dangers of anti-Semitism, racism, intolerance and prejudice - will not be forgotten".

Pupils have also enjoyed visiting St Mary's Catholic Primary School to read with Year 5 pupils, sharing their favourite stories and even signing the primary pupils' reading logs. The trip was a great success, fostering a love for reading in both groups.



Enrichment - Eton College Visit

In March 2025, eight Year 10 boys accompanied Mrs Henderson and Mr Moon to Windsor for a unique two-day visit.

We flew to London Heathrow, enjoying spectacular views of the London skyline, before travelling to Windsor by train. Upon arrival, we were fortunate enough to observe the Changing of the Guard outside Windsor Castle before visiting the castle itself. Pupils enjoyed a comprehensive audio tour of the castle and activities linked to their GCSE English Literature and History study focused on Elizabethan England and Shakespeare's *Macbeth*. Specific highlights of the visit to Windsor castle included paying our respects at Queen Elizabeth II and Prince Phillip's resting place in St George's Chapel and seeing the bullet which killed Nelson during the Battle of Waterloo. Salvador said that he had enjoyed learning about a 'rich and royal culture with each room telling a different story'.



The beautiful Windsor sunshine allowed us to enjoy ice cream before a boat tour of the river Thames. Our first day was concluded with an enjoyable meal and a visit to the theatre to see *Showstopper: The Improvised Musical*. Pupils marvelled at the talented cast and musicians who were able to improvise an entire 90-minute show with audience input.

The following day, pupils were fortunate enough to be immersed in life at Eton College. Eton College was founded in 1404 by King Henry VI to educate 70 King's Scholars. As a result of its historic founding, Eton College has many significant artefacts and has educated prominent politicians and royalty.

Throughout this academic year, we have been working closely with Eton College as a partner school on outreach initiatives which resulted in our visit.





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Enrichment - Eton College Visit

Our Year 10 boys conducted themselves in an exemplary manner and impressed Eton's staff and pupils alike.

Pupils engaged with a full day of lessons and activities which included: utilising AI to aid revision; public speaking; self leadership and a full tour of the school, including its historic chapel where two Old Etonians had carefully removed an unexploded WWII bomb and received the St George Cross for their bravery.

Pupils also had the opportunity to explore Eton College's museums and observed an Egyptian era plinth marked with Pharaoh Ramesses II's name. This provoked relevant discussion for the pupils' study of Shelley's poem Ozymandias. Our day at Eton College culminated with a question and answer session with two Sixth Form pupils, originally from a state school in Preston, who are the recipients of the Orwell Award which is a full Sixth Form bursary.

Whilst reflecting on the day during our journey home, Francis enthused that his day at Eton College 'filled me with passion and enthusiasm not only for my scholastic future but for life'. The trip was a unique and unforgettable experience for the boys which has sparked further aspiration, interest and enthusiasm for learning.
