



Headteacher's Letter

As the winter term comes to an end, our school community has been united in the spirit of Advent. For us as a Catholic school, Advent is not only a season of waiting and preparation for the birth of Christ, but also a time to reflect on hope, peace, joy, and love — the values at the heart of our faith. These weeks have reminded us that Advent is about more than looking ahead to Christmas; it is about preparing our hearts, deepening our faith, and living out the Gospel through kindness and service.

Within our school, this has been expressed in many ways: through prayer and liturgy, through charitable acts that support those in need, and through the daily encouragement pupils give one another. Advent calls us to be a community of light, and I am proud of how our children and staff have embraced this calling together.

Once again, this has been a very busy term full of wonderful events and brilliant achievements. Our children have worked exceptionally hard in class, earning over 52,000 achievement points, alongside 26 Headteacher's Awards and four special Headteacher's Reward Breakfasts. These milestones reflect not only academic effort but also the values of perseverance and excellence that we hold dear.

Academically, we continue to set the standard. Last summer, our Year 11 pupils achieved an outstanding 152 Grade 9s, surpassing even our record-breaking results of 2024. We are proud to share that our school now ranks 14th nationally among all state 11–16 secondary schools for excellence grades. A remarkable testament to the dedication of both staff and pupils.

Our children displayed impeccable behaviour during this year's Remembrance commemorations. It was a privilege to represent the school at the Chorley Memorial in November, where I was joined by our Head Girl, Maebh, and Head Boy, Joseph. Their presence reflected the dignity and respect shown by all our pupils.

Within school, our Remembrance services were deeply moving, with pupils demonstrating a profound sense of reverence and gratitude for those who gave their lives in service. This respectful conduct is a hallmark of our community and something of which we can all be proud.

Oracy continues to be a key focus for us this year, helping pupils to develop confidence, clarity, and the ability to express themselves effectively. Our Year 7 pupils particularly enjoyed Sky Hawk Cross Curricular Day, when we had the privilege of welcoming author Gill Lewis to our school. This inspiring visit encouraged pupils to think deeply about storytelling, communication, and the power of words.

We have also celebrated some wonderful achievements in public speaking competitions, where our pupils demonstrated not only skill and eloquence but also courage and creativity. These successes highlight the importance we place on giving every child a voice and nurturing their ability to share ideas with conviction.

This term, our pupils have also embraced opportunities to support younger children in our local feeder primary schools. Through reading sessions, they have acted as role models, sharing their love of books and helping to inspire confidence and enjoyment in literacy among the younger pupils. These moments of mentorship strengthen the bonds between our schools and highlight the generosity of spirit within our community.

The sense of community has never felt stronger than during our highly successful Open Evening in October, when over 1,300 visitors joined us as they made the important decision of choosing a secondary school for their child. The warmth, enthusiasm and deep commitment shown by our pupils and staff left a lasting impression on all who attended.

Outside of the classroom, pupils have enjoyed exciting and informative experiences. These included trips to the Battlefields of France and Belgium, where history was brought vividly to life, and a festive visit to the Christmas markets in Arras, France, which combined cultural enrichment with seasonal joy. We were immensely proud to receive messages from members of the general public who were in France and Belgium at the same time as our pupils, commending their behaviour and respectful manner. Such recognition reflects the values we strive to instil and is a credit to the children, their families, and our staff.

Alongside this, we have celebrated numerous sporting achievements. From success in local fixtures to outstanding performances in regional competitions, our pupils have demonstrated teamwork, determination, and skill. Their commitment both on and off the field reflects the values of discipline and perseverance that we encourage in every aspect of school life.

Our Aspirations Programme continues to provide pupils with valuable opportunities to visit other schools and broaden their horizons. Through these experiences, pupils gain insight into different learning environments and are inspired to aim ever higher in their own studies and ambitions. We are delighted to have established strong, positive relationships with Eton College, Cheltenham Ladies' College, Bolton School, and Stonyhurst College. These partnerships enrich our pupils' educational journey and encourage them to see what is possible when they set their sights on excellence.

Our Year 11 pupils have recently completed their GCSE mock examinations, and I am very pleased with the mature and responsible approach they have taken towards these assessments. Class teachers are now carefully marking their papers, and upon our return after Christmas, the focus will shift to identifying areas that require further attention and improvement. If your child is in Year 11, I would like to remind you of our extensive programme of after-school revision sessions. These sessions provide invaluable support, and I strongly recommend that all pupils in the year group attend as many as possible to maximise their preparation for the summer examinations.

Our engagement with our local parishes continues to go from strength to strength. This term, senior parishioners — including some of our pupils' grandparents — enjoyed a wonderful Christmas party organised and led by our Leadership Academy. I would like to extend my sincere thanks to all who generously donated gifts for the bingo and raffle, which added so much joy to the occasion. Parishioners thoroughly enjoyed their time in school, and the spirit of service and love was evident throughout. I would also like to express my gratitude to our parish priests, who remain so supportive and highly visible within our school community. Their presence and guidance enriches our shared mission and strengthen the bond between school and parish life.

We will bring this term to a close with our Christmas service at St Gregory's Church, a joyful occasion that unites us in prayer and celebration. As a community, we look forward to another exciting and successful term ahead.

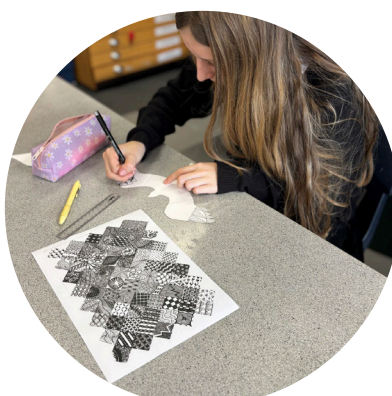


Sky Hawk Day

Battlefields Visit 2025

Pupils got to explore original trenches of World War 1, took part in the Last Post ceremony at the Menin Gate, visited the cemeteries, Ypres old town and explored the desolate battlefields of the Somme in France. They also visited a number of museums, including the Flanders Fields Museum in Ypres and the Somme Museum in France.

Father Graeme, who accompanied the visit said "I want to thank all those involved in the trip. They were all a credit to the school; it had so much content, the children behaved impeccably, and they showed such reverence and respect at all the graveyards and memorials we visited. I found the whole experience not only informative but also very moving and this was due largely to the behaviour of the pupils. Christmas Markets - France

The trip was rounded off by a visit to Boulogne-sur-Mer, France's largest fishing port where pupils gathered for prayer at the impressive cathedral in the old town, followed by some souvenir shopping at the local Saturday market.

Staff were impressed with our pupils, who really engaged in the activities, asking thoughtful questions whilst demonstrating excellent behaviour. Not only were they brave enough to try out their language skills, some pupils discovered a new found fondness of snails!

After four fun packed days, the pupils arrived back to English soil very tired (and full!), but with memories that will last a lifetime.



Savio House

Debate Club, open to all pupils in Years 10 and 11, has been a particular highlight. Meeting after school each Wednesday, pupils have explored a wide range of topics, from the role of the monarchy to the impact of tourism on the modern world. We were also delighted to take part in a mock debate against Bolton School and look forward to building stronger links with their debate team in the future. With plenty of games and light-hearted challenges included, it has been wonderful to see pupils growing steadily in confidence.

Alongside this, Year 11 pupils, Salvador, Holly and Annie, successfully qualified for the next round of the English-Speaking Union's prestigious public speaking competition, which will take place early in 2026.

At Key Stage 3, Zico and Will from Year 9 represented Holy Cross at the Great Lancashire Debate at County Hall, Preston. They both delivered their speeches with impressive eloquence and maturity. Zico was awarded Best Overall Speaker out of 20 participants, and together the pair achieved a Highly Commended award for their speech and delivery. Speaking in such a notable setting was an invaluable experience for them both.

This term also saw five pupils take part in delivering poems for Remembrance Day, speaking with sensitivity and respect. In addition, our Head Boy and Head Girl wrote and delivered outstanding speeches on Open Evening, after working exceptionally hard in rehearsals and receiving coaching to help them prepare. Their professionalism and dedication were a credit to the school. We are really excited for the further oracy opportunities that 2026 has in store!



Reading Intervention

This year has been an incredible one for reading intervention at our school. Thanks to the hard work of our pupils and staff, we've seen outstanding progress in reading performance across all year groups. Many pupils have graduated from the intervention programme with renewed confidence and a love for reading - a testament to their dedication and the collaborative effort between pupils, teachers and families.

Building on this success, our reading community has been reaching out beyond the classroom. This term we have enjoyed wonderful visits to Anderton St Joseph's Catholic Primary School, where our pupils loved sharing stories and inspiring younger readers; we enjoyed festive reading with St Joseph's, Chorley and Sacred Heart Catholic Primary School to share Christmas stories with KS1. This really created magical moments that spark a love of reading.

Community outreach will continue into the new year, with further trips to local care homes, bringing joy and connection through shared stories and art. These visits are always a highlight - not just for the residents, but for our pupils too, who love the warm welcome the residents have to offer.

Earlier this term, our Parents' Information Session added another layer of support; offering families practical strategies and resources to nurture reading at home. By working together - school, families, and the wider community - we are creating an environment where every child can thrive as a confident, enthusiastic reader.





Year 10 Scholars Programme

All Year 10 pupils were given an exciting opportunity to join our newly launched Scholars Programme. The Programme aims to stretch pupils academically, learn valuable skills, including independent learning and time management, and develop their resilience, enabling them to unlock their full potential and prepare them for life at university, apprenticeships or employment. Thus far, pupils have engaged in sessions on setting SMART targets, improving oracy by presenting an elevator pitch and looking at post-16 options with both our Careers Lead and a speaker from EE delivering insightful presentations.

At the start of the academic year, 17 Year 10 pupils attended the British Science Festival which was hosted by Liverpool John Moores University. Throughout the day, pupils attended numerous lectures by industry leaders on topics with significant importance in the modern world such as Water Pollution and Synthetic Antibodies. Pupils also got the chance to talk to University Lecturers about studying Astrophysics as well as discussing career opportunities with the pharmaceutical company AstraZeneca.



Pupil Aspirations

Thanks to our partnership with Bolton School, we have taken 15 pupils for A' Level taster sessions enabling pupils to develop a deeper insight into what studying different subjects at A' Level involves. Pupils have attended sessions on Graphics, Classics, Computer Science and Politics, with all sessions positively influencing pupils as they consider their post-16 options. These sessions will continue throughout 2026, with A' Level taster sessions in Economics, History, Chemistry, Maths, Geography, and English already confirmed for the year.

Finally, Year 9 pupils were invited to attend a Healthcare event at Bolton School which showcased Further Education programmes related to Medicine, Nursing, Midwifery, Social Care, Public Health, Biomedical Science, Paramedical Science, Physiotherapy and Occupational Therapy. This engaging event was hosted by the University of Greater Manchester. Pupils were also able to discuss the different medical courses with course leaders and current academics, clearly illustrating the career opportunities that each course can open.

As our partnerships with the independent school sector, employers and apprenticeship providers strengthens, we look forward to future planned events at Stonyhurst College, Eton College, Cheltenham Ladies College and British Aerospace Engineering.
